Through engaging with stories that stimulate their imaginations, children are encouraged to think critically, solve problems, express emotions, and collaborate with others. Picture storybooks offer a rich, multisensory experience that supports language development, emotional growth, and artistic expression. By providing children with opportunities to engage with stories in interactive and creative ways, teachers lay the foundation for lifelong creative thinking, helping children develop the skills and confidence they need to navigate the world with imagination and curiosity.

In addition to the cognitive, emotional, and social benefits, the use of picture storybooks also helps in developing children's attention span and focus. Reading and engaging with picture books require children to concentrate and pay attention to details, such as the sequence of events, characters' emotions, and visual cues in the illustrations. These moments of focus not only enhance the children's ability to follow and understand stories but also improve their overall concentration, which is a valuable skill in all areas of learning. As children become more immersed in the narrative and illustrations, they naturally develop better attention to detail and an ability to engage in focused activities for longer periods. Furthermore, picture storybooks provide an excellent platform for encouraging the development of moral values and ethical reasoning. Many picture books

contain themes related to kindness, honesty, fairness, and other ethical principles. When children engage with these stories, they often reflect on the behaviors and choices of the characters and how these actions align with their own values. These reflective moments encourage children to internalize important moral lessons and to think critically about how their actions can impact others. This process helps children develop a solid moral framework, which is an essential component of both their personal and creative growth. Another significant advantage of using picture storybooks in the classroom is that they introduce children to the concept of diversity and inclusion. Through stories featuring characters from various backgrounds, cultures, and abilities, children are exposed to different perspectives and learn to appreciate the richness of human diversity. This exposure helps build tolerance and respect for others, laying the foundation for a more inclusive mindset. As children learn about diversity through the lens of stories, they are encouraged to think creatively about how to interact with and embrace people who may be different from themselves, further broadening their imaginative capabilities.

As part of the creative process, teachers at RA Nurul Hidayah also encourage children to express their ideas through a variety of art forms, not just limited to drawing or painting. For example, children are given the chance to create three-dimensional models or use recycled materials to bring characters or scenes from the story to life. This hands-on approach encourages resourcefulness and allows children to experiment with different mediums. Whether through sculpting, building, or collage-making, these activities support children's understanding of spatial relationships and foster their ability to think in three dimensions, an essential skill in creative problem-solving. Lastly, the integration of picture storybooks into the curriculum encourages a lifelong love of reading and learning. As children develop a deep connection with stories and characters, they are more likely to develop a habit of reading outside the classroom as well. This passion for books extends beyond the confines of the classroom, nurturing curiosity and the pursuit of knowledge throughout their lives. Picture storybooks provide an accessible and engaging introduction to the world of literature, creating an environment in which children feel comfortable exploring new ideas, learning about the world around them, and developing a lifelong appreciation for storytelling. Through this process, they not only improve their academic skills but also cultivate a sense of wonder and creativity that will serve them throughout their educational journey and beyond.

CONCLUSION

Based on data validation and comparison with previous findings, it can be concluded that illustrated story media is proven to be effective in increasing the creativity of children aged 5-6 years. The results of this study are in line with the theory of child development and previous studies which show that visual-based methods can stimulate children's imagination and creativity. Although there are challenges in implementation, the results of this study provide important implications for teachers, parents, and educational institutions in developing more innovative learning strategies. With further research, it is hoped that illustrated story media can continue to be developed as a more effective and enjoyable learning tool for early childhood.

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
